Entrance Examinations

Information about test scores and requirements for admission to Advanced College may be found in the “Admission” sections of the school catalog. Advanced College requires international students to take an English Proficiency Exam before admission for an Associate Degree or other Certificate program, but not for admission into the English as Second Language (ESL) Program.

Credits

The quantity of academic work a student completes is measured in “Credits.” The number of credits of a course depends on the number of hours per week. A “3-credit course” will meet three hours weekly for one semester.

Before Leaving Your Home

Passport:

Be sure your passport is current and will not expire in the next six months. If your passport is going to expire soon, the consulate may not issue you a new one. Also, keep a copy of your passport in a different place from your passport in case the passport becomes lost or stolen. When you arrive in the U.S. for passport renewal, your embassy/consulate may need a letter verifying that you are a full-time student.

Applying for a Visa in your Country:

The visa is permission granted by the U.S. to request entry into the United States. You will need to make an appointment for a visa interview at the U.S. Embassy or Consulate. When you have an interview with the Consulate, be sure that you have all the following documentation:

- Valid I-20 (Advanced College to issue)
- Letter of Admission from Advanced College
- Financial or Bank guarantee

- Parental consent (if applicable)

Visa Types

F-1 or M-1 Student: This type of visa permits an individual to enter the U.S. for full-time student at an authorized institution in the U.S. I-20 is the form issued by the educational institution to the international student upon his/her admission. The student takes this form to the U.S. embassy or consulate to apply for the F-1 or M-1 visa. Upon issuance of the I-20, the international student is responsible for paying the SEVIS I-901 fee, which can be done via the US Immigration and Customs Enforcement website at: www.ice.gov/sevis/i901/index.htm

F-2 Spouse/Dependent: This type of visa is held by spouses and dependents of F-1 students. To receive an F-2 visa, the spouse presents an I-20 form in the name of the F-1 student to an American Embassy or Consulate abroad, with evidence of financial support. An F2 dependent does not have permission to be employed.

Receiving a Visa

After you receive your visa, you will either have a “multiple” or “single” entry visa. The multiple entry visas will let you enter and leave the U.S. without any restrictions with a valid I-20 from Advanced College.

If your American Embassy or Consulate denies your visa, usually there will be an explanation provided as to why the visa was not granted. After submission of any missing documentation, you may be granted the visa.

Your Health before Arriving

Be sure to have a complete physical and dental examination before you leave your home country. Let your physician know that you are going to study in the United States for several years, and find out how you can get any medication that you might need. There is a possibility that your home doctor might be able to help by referring you to a source for prescription drugs in the USA. Also, be sure to get copies of your medical records translated into English if your doctor recommends it.

A word of advice is to get all of your dental work complete before arriving into the United States. Dental work is very expensive and it is not covered by most health insurance plans in the USA.

Arriving in the United States

I-94 Form (Departure Record):

This form shows that you have been lawfully admitted to the U.S. I-94 form is the small white card that is usually stapled into your passport on the page next to American visa. This form is given to every foreign person who enters the U.S. This form has an 11-digit number, which is the Arrival/Departure number. This is a computerized number, which INS assigns to you to keep track of your arrival and departure from the U.S. This form is very important because it also shows your visa status and the expiration date of your stay in the U.S. Be sure to make a copy of this form and keep the copy in a safe place.

About Los Angeles and Stockton

“The City of Angels” rests between mountains, oceans, and deserts. Founded in 1781 by Spanish settlers, the city now represents over a hundred different cultures, with almost a hundred languages. The city is unique; with many freeways surrounded by beaches, home to generations of movie stars, making a difficult choice between surf, sun, Disneyland, of basking in reflected stardom in Beverley Hills, Hollywood Hills, and L.A. offers the visitor a glimpse of its legendary past.

Located in San Joaquin County, Stockton was founded in 1849 by Captain Charles Maria Weber and is the first community to not be named of Spanish or Native American origin. Stockton is located little under an hour from the state capitol, Sacramento and under three hours from Lake Tahoe, the largest freshwater lake.

Climate and Weather

Sunny Los Angeles enjoys pleasant weather throughout the year. The temperatures tend to be moderate, seldom exceeding 85°F/30°C or falling below 45°F/7°C. Sunshine reigns most of the year.

Stockton weather tends to have annual high temperatures of 75.7°F/24.3°C and annual lows at 48.3°F/9.1°C.

Housing

South Gate

Apartment rentals range in a wide variety of different neighborhoods and surrounding cities. The rental prices for a studio or one bedroom range from \$1000-1200 a month in the South Gate area. Areas surrounding South Gate include Compton, Paramount, and Downey.

Stockton

Apartment rentals range in a wide variety of different neighborhoods and surrounding cities. The rental prices for a studio or one bedroom range from \$700-\$950 in the Stockton area. Areas surrounding Stockton include Lodi, Lathrop, and Galt.

Suggested Questions for Landlords:

1. How much is the security deposit and monthly rent?
2. What is included in the rent? Especially utility and if not what is the average monthly cost of the utilities.
3. Can I share the apartment with anybody? If so, how many people?
4. How long is the monthly lease?
5. Is there a laundry facility available?
6. Is there an additional charge for parking?

Los Angeles Attractions

Los Angeles is a city where you can surf at the beach in the morning and ski in the snowfields in the afternoon. The surrounding mountains of Los Angeles offer hiking and rock climbing in summer. Los Angeles has more than 320km (200mi) of bike trails, shopping, star spotting, and roller coaster screaming areas.

Some of these areas include:

- Universal Studios: this park is packed with the latest special effects and rides to the themes of many famous films
- Disneyland: one of the most famous theme parks in the world. It offers a huge selection of rides and activities for both adults and children.
- Rodeo Drive: The place to shop in “style” with its large selection of the most exclusive shops found anywhere.
- Griffith Park Observatory and Planetarium: This is the largest municipal park in the U.S. It also contains one of the largest space telescopes open to the public.
- The Museum of Contemporary Art (MOCA): permanent collection, thematic exhibitions of international scope. Painting, sculpture and environmental works created since 1940.

- Magic Mountain, A park of roller coaster rides and fun entertainment for the entire family.
- The Museum of Tolerance: This museum looks deeply into the history of human rights' atrocities throughout the world

Beaches:

- Santa Monica Beach: one of the widest and most popular beaches in the Los Angeles area
- Venice Beach: one of the most urban beaches, where there are a lot of people, shops and activities
- Manhattan Beach: a hot spot for surfing, body surfing, or boogie boarding
- Hermosa Beach: a great spot to surf, play volleyball, or take a ride on the bike path
- Redondo Beach: the pier at your disposal, this is a great place to bring the kids
- Malibu Beach: most famous beach in Los Angeles
- Long Beach: a popular place to take the family. It is surprisingly pleasant for its urban environment
- Marina del Rey Harbor: one of the largest harbors in the country for pleasure crafts.
- Topanga Beach: one of the most popular surf spots in the area with a wide sandy beach perfect for sunbathing on hot summer days

Stockton Attractions

Stockton is a 50 minute drive to the state capitol of Sacramento or an hour and a half drive to San Francisco. Although located in Central Valley, Stockton is a drive away from the bay area and its exciting attractions.

Some of these areas include:

- San Francisco: Fisherman's Wharf, Golden Gate Park, Pier 39, Alcatraz Island, Palace of the Fine Arts, Twin Peaks, Coit Tower, China Town, California Academy of Sciences, Exploratorium, and Ghirardelli Square.
- Monterey Bay Aquarium: a well-known aquarium along the coastline with exhibits ranging from otter habitats to touch pools
- Santa Cruz Beach Boardwalk: Amusement park on the beach with variety range of games and rides.
- Caramel-by-the-Sea: Enjoy a 17-mile drive through Pebble Beach and Pacific Grove
- California State Railroad Museum: Documenting museum of railroad

- history via old locomotives in Sacramento
- California State Capitol Museum: Museum around the California State Capitol and home of California State Legislature
 - Raging Waters of Sacramento: Seasonal water park with a variety of waterslides, wave pool, and cafes

Traveling in and Outside of the United States

If you travel within the U.S. be sure to carry your passport and I-20. Be sure to keep a copy of your passport and I-20 in a place separate from your passport in case these documents become lost or stolen.

How to contact Medical Care

In a non-emergent medical situation, such as an ear infection, you will need to find a “family doctor” or “general practitioner.” Usually you can contact your insurance provider to request a list of doctors who belong to your insurance “network.” Most physicians will require making an appointment in advance before they agree to see you and the waiting time can be a few weeks. Also, when you have an appointment with a doctor, it is important to be on time since Americans are very time conscious. In an emergency such as suffering from serious bleeding, pain, or in danger of death, go to the nearest medical facility.

How to Call an Ambulance

In case of emergency, dial “911” and tell the operator that this is a medical emergency and an ambulance is needed. Usually paramedics may issue instructions over the telephone while the ambulance is on its way in some urgent situations.

Transportation and Utility

Metropolitan Transit Authority (MTA) – Los Angeles

Three Metro Rails lines are operational: the Red, Blue and Green, which can take you to a number of popular places. Ticket vending machines are located in each station

Purchasing a Car/Auto Insurance/Driver’s License

If you purchase a new car, there are legal and financial obligations

involved. First, you must go to the Department of Motor Vehicles and apply for a driver's license. Also, you are required by law to have car insurance. In the Yellow Pages of the telephone directory under the heading insurance, there is a list of insurance companies.

Telephone, Electricity, and Cable

Usually the new tenant must start utility services, such as telephone, electricity, and gas. Also, ask your landlord about which services are provided and which services the tenant must arrange. You will need to call the telephone company to hook up your phone. The telephone company requires a deposit (refundable). Also, for electricity and cable, you will need to call those companies. (Usually the landlord provides all the phone numbers for these agencies).

Purchasing Items

Grocery Stores

There are a number of large grocery stores or "supermarkets" around our campus. Many of these chains have stores in different locations. The telephone directory lists these different locations. There are also many ethnic grocery stores listed in the yellow pages. Some ethnic restaurants sell packaged ethnic foods. You can ask from people of your native home about where they have found ethnic food.

Convenience Stores

There are small centrally located stores which frequently also sell gasoline. These stores are not a good place to buy large amounts of supplies because their prices are generally much higher than other stores.

Restaurants

Restaurants are listed in the Yellow Pages under "restaurants." There are a variety of good restaurants in our area. Mexican, Greek, French, Italian, Japanese, Indian, and other ethnic restaurants are available, as well as traditional American restaurants.

Shopping

Where and how you shop will make a great deal of difference in how much you spend and the quality of products that you buy while you are in California.

Cultural Differences

Culture Shock

Culture shock happens when you find American culture, people, climate, customs, food and fashion to be very different from your native home culture. It is normal to go through this culture shock. You have to be aware that culture shock cannot be completely eliminated in a short period of time. The best way to reduce culture shock is to do your homework and study before coming to the U.S. Socializing with Americans is a great way to learn and know about their culture. Also, it is important to realize that Americans are acting according to their own set of values, not to values from your own country.

Directness

Most Americans generally do not like to discuss religion, political beliefs, age, weight, or salary. They are usually sensitive about their physical appearance. It is not polite to tell them that he/she is overweight or fat.

American Names

American names generally have three parts: the first name, the middle name or initial and the last or family name. Usually, the first name appears first, then the middle name and finally the last name

“NO” Means “NO”

If you say “no” you may not be asked again. For example, if you are a dinner or lunch guest and have been offered more food, be sure to say “no” only if you really do not want any more.

Punctuality

It is very important and essential to be on time for classes, social events, and appointments. Americans put great emphasis on being “on-time.” If you must miss an appointment or if you will be late, be sure to telephone the person you are supposed to meet to cancel or delay your meeting.

Other Tips

Personal Safety Tips:

- Be sure to let friends or neighbors know where you are going, when you plan to return, and how you can be reached at your destination
- Pay attention to those walking around you
- Avoid jogging when streets are deserted in late evening or early mornings
- Do not carry large amounts of cash or other valuable objects
- Take your personal belongings with you, even if you leave for a moment
- If you are being followed by someone, go to a public place and ask for help
- Do not pick up hitchhikers
- Lock your doors and close windows at night, prior to going to bed
- Never open the door to a stranger

Driving Safety Tips

- Talking, texting, or even holding of cell phones while driving will result in a fine
- Do not try to read a book or newspaper or magazine article while driving
- Do not listen to music loudly as to not be able to hear emergency vehicles such as ambulance, firefighters, or police officers
- Make room for cars that are entering the highway. Check your mirrors and merge left well before coming to a highway on-ramp that has cars entering the highway
- If your car breaks down, raise the hood and windows, and wait in your car locked for a law enforcement officer to arrive

Alcohol Awareness:

California has strict laws regarding the use of alcohol, especially driving under the influence of alcohol or underage drinking is not allowed.

Drunk Driving:

If you are driving a bicycle, car and are under the influence of alcohol or any illegal drug, you may be arrested for “driving under the influence.

Underage Drinking:

California’s laws prohibit the sale of alcohol to anyone under age 21. Being arrested for the sale or possession of alcoholic beverages by underage persons can result in a jail sentence and/or a fine and possible suspension driving privileges.

Shoplifting:

Shoplifting is removing merchandise from stores without paying. Shoplifting is a serious crime in California, and merchants are alert to any possible offenses. Be sure to keep your chosen items clearly visible as you shop and show them to the cashier.

Bribing is a Crime:

Do not attempt to bribe anybody in the U.S. Bribery is a serious offense and the punishment are fines and/or imprisonment

Money and Banking:

Do not carry large amount of money or keep it in your room. Establish an account at one of the banks in your local area so that your money can be kept in a safe place.

There are 2 different types of accounts:

- Checking Account – usually based on how much money is in the account and how many checks you write. Discuss your situation with the people at the bank to find the types of account that is best suited to your need.
- Savings Account – designed to hold money in a bank or savings and loan association for longer periods so that it can earn interest

Tipping

It is customary to tip food services. Usually, people tip 15-20% of the total bill (or double tax amount) unless you are dissatisfied with the service.

Telephone Directory:

The telephone directory is a useful source of information. It has a list of almost everyone in the area that owns a phone, their address, and their telephone number. The directory lists area codes, call rates, and business phone numbers

Going Dutch:

It is very common in the U.S. to split the bill, meaning that each person pays for his or her meal.

Academic Assistance:

If you are having difficulties with your studies, seek the advice of your faculty or your academic advisor.

Finding a Job:

After completion of a degree program, international students are eligible to apply for OPT (Optional Practical Training). This work authorization permit allows you to work full-time for up to one year.

Day Light Savings Time:

48 states in the U.S. (except Arizona and Hawaii) have daylight savings time. That means twice a year, in mid-March and mid-October, clocks are adjusted forward by one hour in the spring and backward by one hour in the fall.

Measuring System:

The measuring system in the U.S. is different than many other countries. The U.S. uses the English measuring system, not the metric. For example, liquid is measured in gallons and ounces and distance is measured by miles, years, and feet. The temperature is measured in Fahrenheit degrees versus Celsius.

Credit Card:

Credit cards are universal and allow you to charge items based on your credit limit. You have the option to pay a minimum on a monthly basis (minimum amount is set by the bank) or pay the full balance each month. If you do not pay fully each month, you may be charged interest based on any unpaid balance. You can pay your tuition and fees at Advanced College with a major credit card such as American Express, Visa, or MasterCard. It can be difficult for international students to open these credit card accounts in the U.S.

Holidays Observed:

These are the major holidays listed below and most schools, colleges, universities, and government offices are closed on these dates:

- Independence Day
- Labor Day
- Veteran's Day
- Thanksgiving (Thursday and Friday)

If a specific holiday falls on a weekend, offices will be closed the preceding Friday or following Monday.
